

Morning Race™ - Ready Race

The Fixes Program™ classroom routine game



What it practices

Morning Race turns arrival into a repeatable routine: enter calmly, put belongings away, move to the learning area, and become morning-ready. The animated Fixes Class enters from the hallway so students can see the routine unfold instead of simply racing a timer.

The goal

Beat the Fixes Class safely. A safe win earns the celebration payoff and lowers the Fixes Class target by exactly 1 second for the next attempt. The teacher-set minimum safe time prevents the game from rewarding rushing.

How to Play

1. Set a baseline	Choose a realistic starting time for your class to complete the full morning routine.
2. Set a safety floor	Choose the lowest safe target. Morning Race will never push the target below this time.
3. Press START RACE	The Fixes Class begins entering from the hallway and moving through the routine.
4. Run the real routine	Students enter, put belongings away, and become ready to learn.
5. Press MORNING READY	Press only when the real class has completed the routine safely and correctly.
6. Celebrate the win	A safe win triggers the full payoff sequence and visibly drops the next target by 1 second.
7. Use UNSAFE when needed	Cancel any attempt that involved rushing or an unsafe routine. The target stays unchanged.

Teacher controls

START RACE begins the attempt.

MORNING READY records the real class time.

UNSAFE cancels the attempt without changing the target.

Gear / Settings changes baseline time, safety floor, or resets progress.

What saves automatically

Morning Race saves its baseline, current target, safety floor, and class best locally in the browser. Its progress is separate from Lineup Race and Carpet Race.

Suggested teacher language

"Beat the Fixes Class safely."

"Belongings away. Desk ready. Morning ready."

"Same routine. Better every time."

Best use

Use it consistently at arrival rather than as a one-off game. The visible target drop gives students a reason to return, while the safety floor keeps the routine focused on quality instead of frantic speed.
